Riding a Tractor



Last month I said we would talk about riding on a tractor. I grew up in the late 40's and 50's. I remember when my dad purchased the last Allis Chalmers WC to come to Bolivar, MO. He drove the tractor to Halfway, MO. that was about 10 miles of gravel road at that time and stopped in front of the School where his mother lived across the road.

Then he still had another 5 miles of rough gravel to travel to get home. I remember looking out the window at school and saw the new tractor and couldn't wait to get home to get on it. I would have been about 8 years old. My dad always told me that I would walk a mile to ride a 1/2-mile on a tractor. He was right and I'm still that way. I might bring the distance down to a 1/4-mile now. I rode many hours holding onto the left fender of that old tractor. If I could get to the tractor first I would get in the seat hoping I would be able to drive. My dad and his brother-in-law and father-in-law farmed about 500 acres between them and did it with the WC and a 1946 Ford 2N. They all had dairy barns and milked 30 to 40 cows each. We raised our own feed and hay. This meant a lot of hours on the tractors. I was allowed to do about everything except pull the combine.

Now, this was 60 years ago and what has changed in that time period. Well, the tractors have gotten bigger and faster. I think now that most tractors are mounted in front of the left rear wheel. You can hardly see the drawbar from the seat. Back then some of the neighbors had John Deere B's and A's and Farmall H's and M's. They had a little platform below the seat and I would see my friends standing up on their tractor while driving. You couldn't do that on a WC.

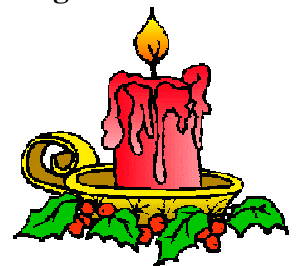
Today we take the tractors off the farm and haul them many miles to shows and parades. Back then the tractor very seldom left the farm and didn't get very far from home. We didn't have trailers to haul them with and finding a ditch bank to back up to when loading and unloading on a 2-ton truck was hard to find. Now, we don't think anything about loading 2 or 3 tractors on a trailer and hauling them 100 miles to a show or go to the Fourth of July Parade or the Christmas Parade. We are still playing with these same tractors today. These tractors are all collectibles today and the kids of today aren't getting the driving time like we did back then. Most antique tractors are on a small acreage and being restored and

the young people today only get to drive in public at the shows and parades or tractor pulls. The biggest thing standing in our way today is liability insurance. With EDGETA having the safety program, it makes it a lot easier to obtain and keep affordable liability insurance. With the lawsuit happy society we have today it gets harder to conduct business and have a little fun. So while we are sitting around this winter we need to try to figure out how we can haul the kids on our tractors safely? We may have to choose a tractor that we can make safer to haul our grandchildren. We will have new Tractor Parade Requirements out very soon.

Northwest Regional Show/Meeting **By Dick Tombrink NW Director**

The 2005 Northwest Regional EDGETA meeting was held by Branch 77 at Culbertson, MT on September 24-25. This was the 42nd year for the Northeast Montana Threshers and Antique Association. Many of the exhibits were acquired



in the early years of the group's existence and are owned by the Association. Although some of the first generation has passed on, the tractors are still there and the younger generation is doing their best to continue to exhibit them. If you are interested in old tractors, this is the show to come to. Some of the old tractors on display included a 40-80 Avery, Rumely Heavyweights such as the 30-60, 15-30, 20-40, and 16-30, several of the Rumely lightweights, Aultman Taylor 30-60, Minneapolis 35-70, Case 20-40 and 10-20, Emerson Brantingham 12-30, Bull 5-12, and a C.O.D 13-25, which is very rare. Most of the tractors were running and paraded each day. In addition they threshed using a Sterling Hand Feed Grain Separator. It was powered by a stationary engine. The bundles were cut by hand and manually fed into the cylinder of the machine. Straw from the separator was salted with quarters and kids in various age groups were allowed to dig for the money. There was a stationary engine display, and an operating drag saw sawing logs. The blacksmith shop was operating. The wives served the noon meal and also provided a good breakfast each morning.

Since the show is held late in September each year, you never know what the weather will be. This year it was cool and overcast, and although it threatened to rain it did not.

I was impressed with Branch 77's emphasis on safety. Each morning a brief safety meeting is held to cover some of the things that could be safety problems during the show. All of the exhibits were well roped. Although there

were not fire extinguishers on each tractor, the operators carried fire extinguishers with them as they ran the tractors. There were not enough tractor operators to operate all the tractors in the parade. Some operators ran 6 or more tractors through the parade each day.

The show attendance was not deserving of the great show that was there. Over the years the population of that area has diminished, and the older generation has passed on. In the past there used to be a couple thousand attending, now it is several hundred.

At the EDGETA Regional meeting Saturday evening, I presented the Hall of Fame Plaque to Gus Peterson, who was inducted into the Hall of Fame this year. Gus is very deserving of the nomination. He served as a National EDGETA director for 20 years, has been a member of 5 branches even though the nearest branch is 200 miles from his home. He has attended well over 20 National EDGETA show since joining in 1975. He is presently a NW Regional Advisor, and continues to work with the branches to schedule the six Regional meeting and the one National meeting each year.

There were 7 branches present at the meeting, branches 9, 15, 21, 29, 51, 67, and 77.

After the meeting Tony Otto gave a very interesting presentation of the history of John Deere tractors.

The branch officers as well as the members and their families were very friendly and hospitable. It is a great show to attend.

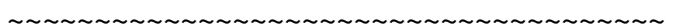
I announced the 2006 National Show would be in the State of Washington and the 2007 National Show would be in Kansas in the Hutchison and Buhler area – Branch 55.

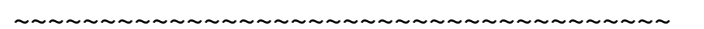
Many of the branches have already started collection the 2006 membership dues in order to have everything ready for the March 15, 2006 deadline to mail them to the National Secretary/Treasurer.

National Show Gentry, AR - Branch 37 September 8-11

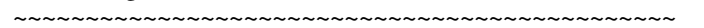

ARTICLE VI - DUES AND INSURANCE

Section 2. Payment of Dues and Insurance Premiums:

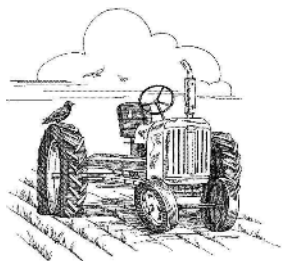
