Insurance Update, December 2006

One of the "Good News" changes that you may need to be reminded of for 2007 is that our insurance premium has gone down. In 2007 your total payment per member to the National EDGETA will be \$9, (not \$10 as it was last year). The National dues remain at \$4 but the insurance premium was reduced to \$5, by your National Directors. This is because our EDGETA insurance premium has gone down. As you may remember the directors will review this yearly and adjust the insurance premiums so that the amount paid in about equals the total EDGETA insurance premium. So when your branch sends in your 2007 National Dues and insurance premiums, send \$9 per member (this goes to Ruth Warnock). This is due by March 15.



The events that are sponsored by your branch must be reported to the insurance agent between 30 and no later than 10 days prior to the event. (Non sponsored events do not need to be reported, and those EDGETA branch members that attend do have our EDGETA insurance coverage, but must follow EDGETA safety requirements.) I continue to see branches reporting events (or shows) at the last minute. There should not be any reason why sponsored events cannot be reported prior to 10 days before the event. Please be sure you report your events at least 10 days prior to the event. If they are reported later than 10 days prior to the event, there is a chance you may not have coverage for your event. You may also remember that now you need to include an estimate of the spectator attendance at your event **prior** to the event. You do not need to report the spectator attendance **after** the event as you have done in the past. The form on the web page to report your events has been changed to reflect these requirements.

Another change this year involves your branch people mover used at non-sponsored events. If you take your people mover to a branch non-sponsored event, the insurance carrier has asked that your branch report it as a sponsored event.

The insurance agent will no longer be sending out insurance certificates in April/May to each branch as they have done in the past. In years past each branch could show this form to those asking for proof that your branch had insurance. This year, if someone needs proof that your branch has insurance; go to the EDGETA web site, under insurance info for the form to submit to request proof of insurance. It will be sent to the person requesting the proof of insurance, not your branch.

Please visit our EDGETA web page, www.edgeta.org, and click on insurance info. We have updated most of the information there over the past several months, including the Q&A section. If you have any questions they probably are addressed there. If you still have a question please send an email note or call either Dick Tombrink or Larry Voris. We will attempt to answer your questions or get you an answer. The insurance agent has asked that we field all questions to take the load off of them.

Submittal of events, additional insured certificates, proof of insurance, etc is done by going to the EDGETA web page, under insurance info, and submitting them on line to the insurance agent. If you need to fax them see the web page for the insurance agent's fax number.

The policy runs on a yearly basis, therefore it would be difficult to change that date without having a part of a year policy. Both National and the Insurance Company are reluctant to attempt such a policy. My home branch starts collecting the membership dues around the first of January in order to have as many members as possible paid up for the year by Mach 15th so we can have our dues ready to send to National on that date. I will agree that it caused, a little extra bookkeeping for the membership committee at the beginning of the year, however it is a lot better than having a lot of old members renewing their membership at the first show of the year. I think all of you will agree that the membership committee would like to enjoy the show rather than spending

their time checking old members for membership when they arrive at the show.

Along with the seed catalogs the new show guides will arrive. With these we can start planning our activities for the 2007 show season. I'm looking forward to attending some of the Regional shows and National during 2007. I plan to attend the SC Regional show hosted by Branches 116 & 120 in Broken Arrow, OK in September and the National hosted by branch 55 in Hutchinson, KS in July. Around these two shows I'll try to build my show schedule and attend as many of the local shows as I can.

The SW Regional Show was held October 7-8th at Santee Lakes, CA. hosted by BR 22 on their 20th anniversary. The displays were located between two of the seven man made lakes on lush green grass beneath an abundance of trees. The engines and other displays were neatly arranged throughout the area amongst dozens of flags representing many different countries, while the tractors were lined up in rows surrounded by flags along one of the lakes with breath taking views of the lake and mountains. The flags were supplied and put up by the local flagman who is 94 years young and a highly decorated war veteran.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS FROM EDGE&TA SECRETARY!!!!

1. **Please read the article that Dick Tombrink wrote very carefully. This is both good news and very important.**
2. **Please make sure the person responsible for submitting dues to the National Secretary is informed of the changes outlined in this article. (This will cause less confusion when submitting checks)**
3. **Please make sure the person responsible for reporting your events is informed of the changes outlined in this article.**
4. **To make sure your branch will be insured and ready for the New Year which begins April 15th, our bylaws state the following.**

ARTICLE VI - DUES AND INSURANCE

Section 2. Payment of Dues and Insurance Premiums:

- a. Dues and insurance premiums are payable to the Secretary/Treasurer by the branches.
- b. Annual dues and insurance premiums for each member are due to the Secretary/Treasurer no later than March 15 for the forthcoming year. Branches are encouraged to submit as many member's dues and insurance premiums as possible by March 15. Those

that are collected later are to be submitted within 30 days. With the payment of the annual dues and insurance premiums, each branch shall submit a current Branch Membership Roster and a list of branch officers and directors.

c. Dues and insurance premiums will not be prorated for part of a year.

Please go to our website www.edgeta.org and fill out the Branch Information form. This is required each year as you elect your branch officers. Even if there are no changes.

Please fill out the Directors form. This is the only way your officers will be covered by our D&O Insurance.

Buttons and stickers will be mailed to each branch early in February. If you need additional membership cards, please email me your request and I will include them in the package. This will help to keep costs down.

Don't forget to include your Branch Number in the subject line of all emails. It is the way we identify you. Also include it when sending additional membership lists for identification and make sure it is on the paperwork you submit to me with your checks. This is really appreciated.

Please help by getting your dues in on time. After I complete my part of the job it has to go to the insurance company. We want you all ready to enjoy the new show season in 2007. This all takes time!! Your cooperation is appreciated. Many branches have shows going on all year and we want to make sure they are insured and ready.

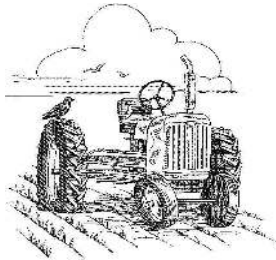

SAFETY TIPS FOR ALL EDGE&TA BRANCHES

Take Time To Be Safe:

Saving a few minutes is not worth the chance of losing a life time. Don't be too busy to be safe. Help teach that attitude to others.

Teach Children About Farm Safety:

When young people become mature enough to help around the farm, it's vital that they receive thorough instructions - including safety instructions. Teach children safety early and often.

Just Say "NO" To Riders:

Children often plead for rides on equipment. It's tempting to say "yes" just so you can enjoy extra time with them. But don't do it - it's simply too dangerous.

Teach Safety By Good Example:

Actions do speak louder than words. Children notice when adults don't follow the Safety Warnings they give. Set a good example by always following safe work practices.

Take A Break...In Fact, Take Several!!

A high percentage of farm accidents occur after 5 p.m. Stress grows from long hours and pushing to finish a job. Fatigue overtakes you before you realize it. Just a few minutes of rest now and again make a big difference in safety and productivity.

When You Work, Keep Others Informed:

Let someone else know where you're working, what you are doing, and when you'll likely return - just in case you do have an accident. A lot of farmers and ranchers are alive today because they were found soon enough to get help. (Can't forget the city folks either.)

Make Sure Your Equipment Is Operating Properly:

Before you take equipment to the field (or operate at a show) inspect each machine thoroughly. Look for loose or broken parts,

check safety shields, guards, reflectors, warning signs, and transport locks. You will be safer and improve performance.

Read the Operator's Manual. Then Read it Again, Carefully:

You know how to start the engine or how to hook up so.. Why read the Manual? Because, in addition to helping you operate more efficiently, the manual is the single best source of Safety Precautions. Study it. Keep it handy. Encourage all operators to read and understand the manual.

Shut it Off...Before You Get Off.

Always disengage the power. Shut off the engine, and remove the key before you work on any part of a machine. When others are working with you, take time to make sure everyone is clear and in view before you restart the machine.

Maintain An Alert Safety Attitude:

Experienced operators think they know everything there is to know about safety. Sometimes they do - yet - they try to by-pass safety procedures. Inexperienced operators also think they know all about safety - and take dangerous short cuts. But no one's strong enough to stop a tractor during a rollover. No one's reflexes are quicker than a P.T.O. Farming safety requires constant awareness of what could happen.

Safety Pays:

Safety is too important and expensive to learn by accident. Consider the impact of injury on your farming or ranching operations. (In our case, club events.) Safety - live with it.

Safety Is EVERYONE'S Job:

Avoid accidents and injuries. Learn to recognize hazards and follow safe work practices. Agriculture work related accidents can be avoided by incorporating safety into your daily management process - and make SAFETY everyone's business.
