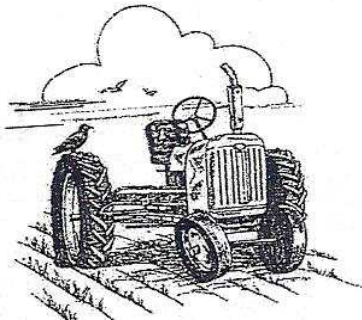
February 1, 2014, so the plaque was presented posthumous.) Eldon and Eric were well represented by their family and friends at the presentation. It was great to see that kind of support.

We had a question about whether it is acceptable for a stationary engine member exhibitor to have his family inside the roped area while he is exhibiting his engines. On our website, under stationary engine displays, it says "Occupancy of the display area shall be at the discretion of the exhibitor/owner and the Activity Safety Officer." So the member exhibitor is in charge and is responsible for what happens there inside the ropes. If his family is there, he is responsible for their well-being. Our insurance agent states that, "The family would not be able to claim damages from the EDGETA policy if, in fact, they were hurt is the bottom line." I know some of you like to have your family with you at the show when you are exhibiting your engines, etc. That is ok, but just be aware that you are responsible for anything that happens to them.

Hope everyone has a safe fall and think safety at all times. Thank you again for thinking safety in all your actions this past summer.

I am getting ready for our regional meeting which will be held at Quarry Hill Orchard's in Berlin Heights, Ohio on October 11 and 12th. I hope we get some members from other branches to come. We are a small branch, and all our members participate. That's a nice thing with a small organization.

VOLUNTEERS

Honor your volunteers – Your show can't run without them! Volunteers are members and non-members that work tirelessly at your branch show. You can't have a show without them. **Remember at an EDGETA show a non-member volunteer cannot help run equipment--only a member volunteer can.**

They probably start before the show mowing, edging, etc. getting the grounds ready for the show. Volunteers work the gate and greet people (exhibitors and spectators) and tell them that they are glad they are here. They guide the exhibitors where to set up their engines, tractors, lawn tractors, big and small equipment, etc. They answer questions or explain all about the equipment for the spectators.

They go around and check for safety, making sure displays have the ropes, stakes, etc. they need to set up their display safely and smoothly (they probably find fuel or water if needed). They (member volunteer) demonstrate the club's bigger equipment-- i.e. the thrasher, the steam engine on the saw mill, the bigger engines, etc.

They help line up for the parade or announce the parade and tell about all the people and equipment. They make your parade interesting.

They work the registration area where they register exhibitor's equipment for the show and the parade. They take membership promoting your branch and EDGETA.

Exhibitors are volunteers too– they volunteer to bring their equipment. They talk to the spectators and explain the equipment they are displaying. They make the show interesting.

One of the most important things your volunteers (member and non-member) can do is thank the exhibitor for bring their equipment to the show. Remember to thank all volunteers – member and non-member alike. They work hard for no pay to make your show a great one!

A line shaft shack with contents was also donated to Branch 37 this year. It has been disassembled and moved to Tired Iron for reassembly later.

I am looking forward to fall and winter with the hopes that my brush hogging business will soon cease until spring so that I can focus on my projects and communicating with the branch presidents of my region. It will be spring sooner than we expect and show time again.
